It's just as well he wasn't born here. The Spanish city is such a delight he may never have left.

Today it is all too easy to come and go — British Airways makes the two-hour hop five times a week from Gatwick.

This city is picture-perfect from every angle. To say it's stunning is an understatement.

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All of the main attractions are within walking distance, or a horse-drawn carriage if you want to treat yourself.

The cathedral is a good place to start. Its hulking gothic form dominates the skyline and is well worth the £6.50 entrance fee.

The Alcazar Palace is equally impressive, easily one of the most beautiful buildings I've ever seen.

Now home to the Spanish royal family, it was built by very different kings – the Moors who dominated southern Spain in the middle ages.

If you are a film buff, you may have seen it before. The palace has been pulling in camera crews since Lawrence of Arabia. Game of Thrones featured its mighty façade and it even cropped up in Star Wars Episode II.

Behind the scenes, Seville's gardens are just as impressive – fragrant flowers, fruit trees, orchards and pools provide a beautiful getaway from the city.

Use the tranquil setting to gear up to the next one – which could hardly be more different. The

ancient tradition of bullfighting is still much loved in Spain, with more than 70 bullrings in Andalucia alone. And the most important is the Real Maestranza de Sevilla which holds up to 10 000 spectators.
